Consistory Highlights

Prior to the business meeting, time was taken to express appreciation to Elders Jarvie Eggart and Northey for their three years of service on Consistory.

Angel Mission:

1. Elder G. Campbell asked about 100% of the staff being volunteers. Elder S. Middlemis-Brown, who sits on the Angel Mission board, explained that previous manager, Terry, has stepped down as the official manager, but still does a lot of the work (but not financial). There were also questions about the food pantry with the change in what organization is now providing food assistance in Houghton/Keweenaw Counties. Elder S. Middlemis-Brown informed Consistory that Angel Mission is still meeting the needs of those families that need help with food security as they work on the transition to the new food providers.

Pastor's Report:

1. Worship:

It is nice to see several new attendees, especially those associated with MTU who have brought children to the church this summer. We've had so many new folks lately that it has been hard for some to remember people's names, so we are going to use name tags in the coming weeks. It is wonderful to simply have the energy of children in the building with us.

2. Ecumenical Engagement:

- a. University outreach: The Cooperative Campus Ministry is sending out "religious preference" cards to incoming students, and we will participate again this year. Afternoon on the Town is coming at the end of August and followed by the new "Faith Fair." We need some ideas to reach out to students.
- b. The Lutherans gathered to discuss demographic

trends. The conversation was good, and broad, there was mention of joining together to support Feeding America and thinking about the possible formation of a Houghton-Hancock Ecumenical Food Shelf.

Old Business

- 1. Elder B. Brookhouse has been compiling the results of the Pastor Evaluations and will email the results to members of Consistory next week. These will be discussed at the July Consistory meeting.
- 2. (Office Manager Smock left the meeting as the Employee Leave Time policy was discussed as this affects her employment. She did return once this discussion was concluded.) A leave policy which will only affect the Office Manager position is being finalized and should become official soon.

New Business

- 1. Consistory will continue to meet on the 3rd Thursday of each month at 7:00 pm. However, for summer meetings they will tentatively schedule a meeting at Pastor Peter's home on Thursday, July 20th, with a potluck dinner beginning at 6:00 pm. Depending on the need to discuss business they may not meet in August.
- Summer activities were discussed. Ideas include an outdoor service to be held in September. and potlucks on the 3rd Sunday of July and August.
- 3. MTU Afternoon on the Town: Elder A. Campbell will take the lead in putting together something to

introduce PLUC to new MTU students.

Rummage Sale a Success

We had a great crowd of shoppers for our June 10 rummage sale. When we opened the doors at 10, the lounge was packed with people and we had a line to the checkout for 45 minutes. For the next couple of hours we had a steady trickle of customers. We consolidated items onto fewer tables, so by the beginning of the last hour, 3 tables had already been emptied and taken down. Then we rearranged items by where they were going - Habitat Re-store, Angel Mission, the Gay Rummage Sale, the AST (teacher's sorority) rummage sale, Goodwill, the MTU

Friends of the Library book sale, and a few items that will be sold on ebay this fall. That made the packing process really easy when the sale was over.

Sometimes, Angel Mission receives generous donations of items that are not necessities for people's wellbeing. The donors expect that we can turn these generous gifts into cash by reselling them. A silver tea service does not make a better cup of tea than a functional tea pot and kettle, but someone of means may wish to purchase it! We had several tables of items donated to Angel Mission at the PLUC rummage sale.

Our proceeds from the sale totaled \$1,226.50. Of that, \$500 went to Angel Mission. Thank you to all of our volunteers for helping with the sale.

Angel Mission

At present, everyone working for Angel Mission is a volunteer and we have no stipend or contract positions. Our volunteers gave 317 hours in the store and an additional 42 hours of background support. We would like to find a dependable individual to act as manager, but no one has come forward.

It is our policy to put onto the store floor all the essentials for household and personal care that we receive. Occasionally, we receive luxury goods, which we have collected over the years. We had 65 large totes of stored luxury items until Bobbie Dalquist put out the contents of 10 totes to sell at the PLUC rummage sale. The sale netted Angel Mission around \$500 after the Fellowship Guild took a small cut for their efforts. Thank you for converting our treasures into useable currency for programs.

In May, Pat's Foods in Hancock donated \$3,330.66 worth of food to the food pantry. We served clients with 60 food pantry

orders to feed 127 adults and 61 children for a week with 11 new signups and an emergency pack outside of regular hours. The next time you are at Pat's, please thank them for their support!

We helped a young, very frightened woman with a water shut off notice. She had never been in this situation before and didn't know what she would have done without our help. Additionally, a young mother and her two-week-old baby came in, needing an entire household setup. We were able to set her up with many household items to get her on her feet and comfortable in her apartment.

We find it hard to keep up with the clothing donations coming in, but the items are going out at a fast rate too. We have received higher monetary donation amounts for this time of year also. We are thankful for the constant support from the Presbytery, the church, and the community.
