Consistory Highlights

Thanks to Ann Campbell for taking notes

As is usually the case, Consistory took July off from having a "formal" meeting. Instead, they met at the home of Pastor Peter where they shared a potluck dinner and then held important discussions. Most of the discussions centered on Pastor Peter's evaluation which led to further discussions about plans for PLUC in the future.

Lois Jambekar sent a letter of resignation from the Campus Christian Ministries liaison position because of planned travel during the busy time for CCM events. Lois has served as the PLUC liaison for 10 years and Consistory thanked her for this important work and Consistory voiced their appreciation for her dedication to this ministry and regretfully accepted her letter of resignation. The Consistory will consider who to ask to replace her, recognizing that a friend of the church or church member could represent PLUC.

Consistory members discussed reestablishing the prayer chain, that could be posted on the website for members' only view, and that would alert Pastor Peter as to special needs for either a phone call or visitation. It would also inform prayer writers of special needs. Pastor Peter has in the past mentioned a need for deacons, and

although church members agree that they would be useful, no one was willing to serve in that capacity.

This segued into a discussion about our relationship with MTU. At one time PC(U.S.A) had a campus ministry in partnership with the Methodists and others. We have had in the past and perhaps need to strengthen a cooperative relationship with Canterbury House, and perhaps Good Shepherd. These two have student organizations. Could we sponsor a progressive Christian organization on campus? Anne Campbell will reach out about this potential.

Afternoon on the Town will need many more cookies than last year. Organizers have an idea of the best way to set up. They will also include an information card with the cookies. Students that sign the register with their contact info will be part of a raffle for \$20 food vouchers.

Angel Mission

A small resale shop on Sixth Street in Calumet liquidated its merchandise and sale equipment, as it went out of business. The shop owners gave us winter coats and prom dresses as well as other remaining items after liquidation. It was a great boon to receive so many quality, gently used items for distribution.

We agreed to be a voice of engagement and inclusion to a working group focused on alleviating the housing crisis in our region. The Western Upper Peninsula Planning and Development Region found that many preexisting social, economic, and infrastructure problems had been exacerbated by the pandemic. These, along with some more recent issues, needed further action if the housing problem were to be addressed. CCAM was invited to participate because of our unique status as a well-recognized, small charity that has been effective in our four-county area.

In the store, volunteers gave 309 hours of service. Support work by the board and committees amounted to an additional 56 hours. Our support hours have diminished somewhat with the summer season, when everyone takes advantage of the lovely weather.

The reduction in food costs after the high prices of the prior months allowed the food pantry to take advantage of special offers from the area grocers. Requests for food assistance remain high. We served 109 adults and 56 children with food to last a week or more. We had nine new clients enroll.

Before winter returns, we need to repaint the soffits and fascia on our building entrances. This work can be completed by a volunteer — PLUC will provide the materials. Contact Pastor Peter or Greg Campbell if you can help out.

We plan to get our carpets cleaned — Pastor Peter reports this has not been done since before COVID.

The hydrant on the East end our building is being replaced with a freeze-proof hydrant. Hopefully, we can avoid future floods in the Pastor's office.

Safety improvements (awaiting funding):

- We would like to continue to improve the exterior lighting of our building.
- We need to replace the aging locks which do not work well.
- We should consider installing reinforcing film on our glass.

Future maintenance needs:

- Painting new stripes in our parking lot revealed the poor condition of the pavement. We will need to consider when and how to deal with this deteriorating surface.
- The brickwork on the East end of building is showing some efflorescence, indicating that moisture is affecting the bricks and mortar. We should consider getting this work done before it becomes more expensive.
- The window near the organ bench is leaking. We will have this looked at before the weather gets bad.
